NEWS IN BRIEF

President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan has expressed his great appreciation of the magnificent gift of \$3,000 recently presented by the B. C. Jockey Club for Simon Fraser bursaries. He said: "The B. C. Jockey Club's action in linking their recent Centennial Celebrations with the students of British Columbia deserves special praise from the community. Simon Fraser's youth brings with it problems since we do not yet have endowments to provide financial assistance to good students who are in need of such help. A number of friends of the University have been most generous in giving money for this purpose to the University and the B. C. Jockey Club gift will be a great help and most timely as we near our large enrollment this September. It is for this reason I would like to publicly thank the B. C. Jockey Club for their generous recognition of the needs of Simon Fraser University."

GRANTS. Six faculty members at Simon Fraser share \$18,439 in grants recently announced by the National Research Council. A \$4,500 grant has been awarded to Dr. F. W. B. Einstein of Chemistry and a similar amount goes to Dr. R. M. Sadleir of Biological Science. Other awards are as follows: Dr. L. E. Ballentine (Physics), \$2,500; Dr. M. McClaren (Bio-Science) \$3,500; Dr. R. J. Tomanek (Physical - Development) \$2,000; and Dr. A. P. van Overbeeke (Bio-Science) \$1,439. UNESCO CONFERENCE. Dr. T. J. Mallinson, head of the Communications Centre, has been invited by the Canadian National Commission for UNESCO, the Canada Council and the Canadian Citizenship Council to join a group of ten educators and government officials in a discussion of "The Dimensions of Canadian Citizenship, 1967" at Stanley House in the Gaspe Peninsula August 11-17. He will be the only representative west of Winnipeg. Dr. Mallinson has participated in a number of similar conferences during the summer semester. He took part in a government conference on conflict resolution among government departments and in another government conference on the characteristics of Canadian society in the twentieth century and their implications for the future of the Social Development Branch of the Department of State. At the invitation of the Edmonton Public School Board he conducted a seminar on the techniques of group dynamics as applied in the classroom. He participated in a regional conference on "Confronting the Barriers in Intergroup Relations" called by the Northwest Chapter, National Association of Intergroup Relations Officers. He served as staff member for a series of leadership seminars in Kelowna organized by the Community Programmes Branch, Department of Education.

ART ORR LEAVES. Best wishes of the University Community go to Mr. A.G. Orr, Manager of General Services, who is leaving Simon Fraser next week for a new position. Mr. Orr was the first staff member to be appointed to Simon Fraser. He joined the University in August, 1963, as Superintendent of Engineering Services and co-ordinated site preparation, design and construction of the University. He has been Manager of General Services since the University opened. A reception in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Orr will be hosted by President and Mrs. McTaggart-Cowan at the President's Residence on Thursday, August 3.

NEW SCHAFER WORK. "Gita", a major new work for chorus, brass, tape and orchestra by R. Murray Schafer, University Resident (Music), will receive its world premiere performance by the Boston Symphony Orchestra at Tanglewood (Berkshire Festival) in Lenox, Mass., the week of August 9th. "Gita" was commissioned by the Fromm Music Foundation. Within the last six months other new Schafer works have been premiered in Vancouver and in Toronto; "Requiems for the Party Girl", "Protest and Incarceration", and "Threnody". Schafer has been in the Maritimes as host of summer music festivals at the University of New Brunswick and University of Newfoundland.
