NEWS IN BRIEF

APPOINTMENT. Professor Jonathan Bennett, a distinguished Cambridge University philosopher, is to move to Simon Fraser next year as Professor and Head of the Department of Philosophy. His appointment is effective September, 1968, and until his arrival the department will continue its system of rotating chairmen. Prof. Bennett has published two outstanding books -- Rationality (Routledge and Kegan Paul, 1964) and Kant's Analytic (Cambridge University Press, 1966). Born in New Zealand he received his B. A. from Canterbury University College (now Canterbury University) in 1950 and his M. A. with first class honors in philosophy from Auckland University College in 1952. He subsequently spent two years at Magdalen College, Oxford, reading toward his B. Phil. in Philosophy which he gained in 1955. In 1956 he was appointed lecturer in Moral Science at the University of Cambridge.

COMING. Dr. John Gunther, Vice Chancellor of the University of Papua-New Guinea will be giving a public lecture on Tuesday, October 17 at 12.30 p. m. in Room 3153. Dr. Gunther, who will speak on "Parliamentary Government in Papua-New Guinea," was for many years Assistant Administrator of the Territory and leader of the House of Assembly. He has published many of his lectures and articles on Papua-New Guinea's current problems.

SENATE. Dr. K. R. Burstein, Psychology Department, and Dr. C. L. Kemp, Biological-Sciences, have been elected by Joint Faculty to Senate and Dr. S. K. Lower, Chemistry, has been asked to continue as Science Faculty representative on Senate. Mr. Mark Collins, President of Smith Lithograph Company of Richmond, succeeds Mr. C. J. Frederickson, who has retired from the Senate.

GRADING. The Senate at its meeting on October 2 moved to change the undergraduate grading system by adding A-minus and C-plus grades to the existing scale. The new grading system will be used this semester and remains in effect until August, 1969.

BALL. The President's Ball will be held this year at the Royal Towers Crystal Ballroom on Friday, December 1. Tickets at \$10 a couple (and further details) will be available soon.

SYMPOSIUM. Intellectual stimulation and refreshing new ideas are included in Simon Fraser's annual academic symposium at Rosario Beach, Washington, on October 20-22. Registration fee for the weekend retreat is \$8 and it covers all meals and accommodation. All students and faculty welcome, with registration forms available from the Student Council Office.
