NEWS IN BRIEF

HOUSING. Attention of all students is drawn to the questionnaire on "Student Housing" on Page R-6 of The Peak. Information from completed questionnaires is expected to be of considerable help to University architects Erickson and Massey, who have been asked to prepare a new plan for overall development of the site west of Madge Hogarth House. Planned development of apartment-style residences will be in conformity with University architecture. It is hoped for an early start on construction of 200 small one and two-bedroom apartments. The self-contained apartments, for married students and single students sharing rental, will be part of the overall development plan. It is hoped the first will be ready for occupancy by September, 1968.

GALAPAGOS. Trevor Chandler, a graduate student in Bio-Sciences, has been invited to join a three-month marine expedition to the Galapagos Islands. He leaves Monterey, California, January 3, aboard the research vessel "Te Vega." The expedition is being organized by the Hopkins Marine Station of Stanford University and will deal with various aspects of oceanography. Mr. Chandler will work closely with biologists from five U. S. universities and marine stations and will carry out his own research on the effect of light on specific nutrients used by phyto-plankton. The Galapagos Islands are the home of giant tortoises weighing up to 500 lbs. and the world's only marine iguanas. Other zoological curiosities include a four-eyed fish and a bird which uses a stick to dig insects from wood. "Te-Vega", a two-masted schooner, was built in Germany in 1930 as a yacht for a millionaire's wife. In World War II the U. S. Coast Guard used the vessel as a patrol ship and in 1956 she was featured in the movie South Seas Adventure.

OUTSIDER. Colin Wilson, who speaks in the Simon Fraser Theatre on Thursday (Nov. 16 at 12.30 p. m.), became an international celebrity when his first book "The Outsider" was published in 1956. His 22 works include eight published novels - Ritual in the Dark, Man Without a Shadow, Adrift in Soho, The Violent World of Hugh Greene, Necessary Doubt, The Glass Cage, The Mind Parasites and The Black Room. His other works include Origins of the Sexual Impulse, Introduction to the New Existentialism and Sex and the Intelligent Teenager. Innovator, iconoclast, philosopher, critic and novelist. Wilson is regarded as the elder statesman of the angry young men.

LETTERMEN. Forty-seven charter members of the Simon Fraser Lettermen's Club have received their sweaters -- earned through participation in football, basketball and swimming. The Lettermen's Club will participate in such activities as ushering at sports events and contributing to various campus activities. The club has set aside one day each week as Lettermen's Day, with members wearing their sweaters on campus. President Dr. P. D. McTaggart-Cowan has told the charter members: "In the two years and two months that we have been a school, you have all contributed to a tremendous advancement. Our record of accomplishments so far proves that athletic scholarships are a good thing. The rest of Canada can learn something from us."
