Discussion Topics: Ape Men? Cave Men? The Missing Link? Lucy? Olduvai Gorge? Many people think that human origins are shrouded in mystery, or far too confusing for the average person to understand. This course is designed to disprove this notion, offering an introductory survey of the basics of human evolution. We begin with a short discussion of anthropology and archaeology, cover excavation and dating techniques, and then evolutionary theory, including a short, non-technical discussion of basic genetics. Modern primates are also covered, prior to an exploration of the human fossil record, beginning with our earliest ancestors some 7 million years ago, and continuing right up to modern humans. We will also discuss modern human variation ("race"), the movement of people into the Americas, ethical issues such as the repatriation of human skeletons, and forensic anthropology.
