NEWS IN BRIEF

HOLIDAY. Simon Fraser observes the Confederation Day Holiday on Monday, July 3. Lectures, laboratories and tutorials are cancelled and offices will be closed. The library will be closed on Saturday, July 1, but will be open with a skeleton staff July 3.

AWARDS. Scholarships and bursaries, ranging from a \$1,000 award in memory of 'the world's greatest salesman' to a \$50 gift raised by students selling books, have been presented to Simon Fraser. The \$1,000 bursary, to be awarded annually, comes from International Business Machines Ltd. It honors Thomas J. Watson, the man who launched IBM on its research, manufacturing and sales program. Mr. Watson, who said "there is no saturation point in education," died in 1956. In addition to the bursary for undergraduates, IBM is giving to the University an unrestricted grant-in-aid of \$500. The University Economics Club is giving a \$50 bursary in memory of Gov. General Georges Vanier. The money was raised through operation of the club's second-hand bookstore on campus. L'Alliance Française de Vancouver has awarded a travelling scholarship of \$1,600 and two cash awards of \$100 each for students who are members of L'Alliance group on campus. A \$500 scholarship for a physics student in post-graduate studies is to be given annually by Canada Iron Foundries Ltd. in memory of Sidney Hogg, a University Convocation founder. An athletic award of \$450 is being given by the Amateur Synchronized Swimming Association of B. C. It will go to a student who participates in swimming and maintains a high scholastic standing.

INDIA. Dr. Elinor W. Ames of the Psychology Department is receiving \$8,200 from the Foundations' Fund for Research in Psychiatry to undertake a year's research on childrearing and personality differences among families of industrial workers in India. Her husband, Dr. Michael M. Ames of UBC Anthropology Department is receiving \$16,700 from Canada Council to study the social implications of industrialization in the same area - the Chota Nagpur plateau region. Mr. and Mrs. Ames leave for Jamshedpur, India, in late August.

PRESIDENT. Professor R. J. Baker, Head of the English Department, has been elected president of the Association of Canadian University Teachers of English. The Association is made up of professors of English throughout Canada. Professor J. M. Sandison of Simon Fraser has been elected secretary-treasurer.

AGREEMENT. The first agreement between Simon Fraser University and the consortium of 12 unions representing employees in the janitorial, maintenance and general service departments was signed Wednesday, June 21. The agreement, which covers conditions of employment, welfare plan and pension plan, is for a two-year period from April, 1966. Rates of pay have been established retroactive to April, 1966, with increases for all categories effective April, 1967. President P. D. McTaggart-Cowan says: "With the signing of this first agreement, I hope it will herald a long period of harmonious relationship with the consortium and that the maintenance staff will again do the fine job they were doing before the strike intervened. The rates of pay agreed upon represent a compromise between rates offered by the University and what the unions sought. Pension and welfare provisions in the agreement are commensurate with those in being for other staff at the University."

PHOTOGRAPHY. Eleven students have been learning to "see with a camera's eye" by working with photographer Fred Herzog in Simon Fraser's Creative Photography Workshop this summer. Their fresh view of Vancouver, expressed in color slides, will be shown in a public program in the Theatre at 12.45 p. m. on Thursday, June 29. Herzog encourages his students to show familiar subjects in unusual views and says: "The camera is an extension of man's eye, which he uses to express his own personal view of life, people, the world. It doesn't only give us the possibility to document the world around us, but to remodel it according to our personal feelings, in which the subject gets stripped of superfluous elements, or in which we stylize, accentuate, confront, typify, generalize, and associate." Herzog, by profession a medical photographer, is recognized as one of the best creative photographers in Vancouver. He was represented in two recent Vancouver Art Gallery shows: the centennial show "Vancouver Between the Eyes" last November and "Art in Action" in April.
