Discussion Topics: Course Objectives:

This course offers an introduction to computer based information systems and to their application in business, including a discussion of issues involved in the use of information systems by management. The course also provides hands-on experience in the use of computers, with particular emphasis on the business applications of microcomputers.

The basic goal of this course is to provide the student with a fundamental overview of both the applications and applicability of computer based technology in business. No specific prior computing knowledge is assumed on the part of the student.
