ARTIST. Joel Smith, an artist who has exhibited widely in the United States and Canada, has been appointed University Resident in the Visual Arts at Simon Fraser University. His appointment is effective January 1. Mr. Smith's appointment follows a two-semester period as an associate with the Communications Centre. He received his early art training at the Otis Art Institute, Los Angeles, and went on to receive degrees from Brigham Young University and the University of California at Berkeley. He has received many awards and has had one-man shows at the San Francisco Art Institute Gallery and the Oakland Art Museum. His work is in a number collections, including the Pratt Art Institute, New York City, Oakland Art Museum and Otterbein College, Ohio. In 1963 his painting "Paranella" was purchased by the Ford Foundation.

BLOOD. A total of 1,127 gave blood at the recent Red Cross clinic at Simon Fraser. First day of the drive drew 332 donors, with 300 on the second day, 265 on the third and 232 on the fourth. Arts came through with 652 donors, Science 281, Education (handicapped by those on PDP being off campus) 144 and others 50.

GEOGRAPHY. Dr. David Lowenthal, Research Associate with the American Geographical Society who lectures here on Tuesday (November 7), is currently engaged in a study of past and present attitudes toward nature and landscape under a Guggenheim Fellowship. He received his B. S. from Harvard, his M. A. in geography from the University of California, Berkeley, and his Ph. D. in history from the University of Wisconsin. He taught geography at Vassar College from 1952-1956 and was a Fulbright Research Fellow at the University of West Indies, Jamaica, during 1956-57. He is the author of a biography of George Perkins Marsh and editor of a new edition of Marsh's Man and Nature. Dr. Lowenthal is also editor of Environmental Perception and Behavior, brought out in the University of Chicago Department of Geography Research Paper Series, and author of many journal articles.

Her poetry has already been accepted by Canadian Forum, West Coast Review, the Poetry Bag, ETC, Quixote, Prism International, and Makar. She credits Dr. Stanley Cooperman, an associate professor of English at SFU, with starting her poetic career, saying "He scribbled all over my stuff and gave me my first constructive criticism."
